SALT & LIGHT

When you think of Halloween, what comes to mind? If you are like me, probably candy! For a lot of people the day is synonymous with costumes, scary stuff, and pumpkins. At first glance it seems like it is nonreligious at best. In fact, many people oppose the practice for one reason or another – usually these reasons are religious in nature. But, did you know that Halloween has some very important Catholic connections?

The origins of Halloween as we know it today date back to ancient Celtic tribes who lived in what is now modern day Ireland, Scotland, Wales, and Britain. For the Celts, November 1 marked the beginning of a new year and the coming of winter. On the night before the new year, they celebrated the festival of Samhain. During this festival, Celts believed the souls of the dead returned to mingle with the living. In order to scare away any (evil) spirits, people would wear masks and light bonfires.

When the Romans conquered the Celts, they added their own touches to the Samhain festival, such as making centerpieces out of apples and nuts for Pomona, the Roman goddess of the orchards. The Romans also bobbed for apples and drank cider traditions which may sound like familiar Halloween things to you.

But what about the Catholic connection?

In the year 835, after observing such a day informally for the previous 100 years or so, Pope Gregory IV moved the celebration for all the saints – which we now call All Saints Day - to November 1 to honor the many saints and martyrs who could not be given their own feast day. (Remember we are all called to be saints since a saint, when it all is said and done, is one we are certain is with God in Heaven)

As is common in the Church on the evening before BIG celebrations (Christmas and Easter) the night before a major feast celebration and observance was a time to hold vigil – praying in thanksgiving for those saints and martyrs whom we would honor the next day – this special time became known as "All Hallow's Even" and later was shortened through common use to our current name "Halloween".

The word "Hallowed" itself should be a familiar one as it is used in the 'Our Father', "...Hallowed by Thy Name" which translates in modern English as "Holy is Your Name". Thus the real meaning of Halloween is "Holy Night / Holy Evening". This puts a different spin on the holiday observance doesn't it? The purpose of the feast of All Saints is to remember those holy ones who have died, whether they are officially recognized by the Church as saints or not. It is a celebration of the communion of all the saints – they are praying for us all the time!

Remember too we are all called to be saints – to live for God and let God work through us on Earth so that we can enjoy eternity and live with him in heaven. So, where Halloween came from is something that we as Catholics can be proud of because it can remind us to celebrate our faith, to be prayerful and thankful for the gifts of the saints, and to pray for those who have died that they enjoy heaven.

FLASHING RED - MEANS STOP !!

School Bus Drivers are required to activate their 8 Way Red Lights in all areas of Rural Strathcona County. Motorists are reminded that vehicles travelling **in both directions** on a 2 lane highway or roadway **must stop** when approaching a school bus that has activated their 8 Way Red Lights to pickup or drop-off students. Failure to stop will result in a **\$402 fine and 6 demerit points**. Bus drivers will forward the licence information of any offenders to the RCMP so that they can issue a ticket.



SCHOOL BUS EVACUATION DRILL

The Transportation Department will be conducting an evacuation drill on **Wednesday, October 22nd**. This drill will be conducted after school during the PM Bus Route. Students riding the Yellow Bus will be arriving home 10-15 minutes later than usual.



EXTRA RIDERS

Increased enrollment results in increased last minute ridership on our schools. We happy with the growth but our buses are getting full to capacity. Students not registered to a bus are not permitted to ride without authorization from the Transportation Office. Drivers will refuse to take any student not registered on their run. Thank you for your cooperation.

PARKING AT THE SCHOOLS

Safety is always the primary concern in student transportation. When dropping off or picking up students at the schools please respect Alberta Traffic Regulations which restrict vehicles from parking:

- in Bus Loading Zones
- within a "No Parking" zone
- within 5 meters of any fire hydrant
- within 1.5 meters of an access to a private roadway or driveway (driveway accessing school parking lots)
- within 5 meters on the approach to a stop sign or yield sign
- within 5 meters of the near side of a marked crosswalk

Parking within these restrictions is not only unlawful, but puts at risk our children and creates the scene of a potential collision. School buses do not have the same turning radius as a car, truck or SUV and the "Danger Zone" is larger.

PLEASE help keep your kids safe by keeping these zones clear!
