After a highly successful first year, the AP program will expand in the fall. Students in grade 10 who have a passion for learning, who have demonstrated consistent, above average achievement, who have high levels of self-discipline and motivation and who are prepared to make a serious commitment to academic learning will find this program an exciting challenge. An outline of the program is attached to this month's newsletter.

Advanced Placement (AP) courses are accelerated, enriched courses which provide extensive background preparation for the Alberta Diploma examinations at the grade 12 level. AP courses follow the regular Alberta Curriculum in preparing students to write Provincial Diploma Examinations. It is expected that courses will be developed using an Inquiry based model which supports differentiated instruction and current assessment practices.

### **GUIDING PRINCIPLES**

- 1. To prepare as many students as possible for optimum success at university.
- **2.** To provide students with an enriched and challenging academic.
- **3.** To develop and extend students' skills of acquiring, organizing and evaluating ideas and information.
- **4.** To stimulate students' critical and creative thinking skills as well as divergent and abstract thinking abilities.
- **5.** To nurture students' independence and autonomy in learning and communicating ideas.
- **6.** To broaden students' experiences through structured interactions with experts from the community.

#### PREREQUISITES FOR REGISTRATION

Because of the rigorous nature of the courses, students considering this program should:

- have demonstrated consistent above average achievement in their academic subjects.
- have demonstrated high levels of self-discipline and motivation.
- be prepared to make a commitment to serious academic learning.
- parental approval and admin authorization.
- a passion for learning

## ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) PROGRAM EXPANDS

#### PROGRAM OUTLINE

- Content in AP classes is delivered at an accelerated pace to parallel and expand upon regular courses.
- 2. Evaluation of Alberta curriculum in these courses parallels that of regular classes. This enables students in AP courses to equally qualify for Rutherford scholarships and to have comparative in-school marks to those they would receive in a regular class.
- 3. Upon completion of senior level courses, students receive a separate evaluation and report regarding their achievement on AP curricula by writing Advanced Placement exams prepared and graded by the College Board, in Princeton, New Jersey.
- 4. AP provides enrichment in English, Social Studies, Mathematics, Science, Biology, Chemistry and, Physics. The program will be offered in those subjects where registrations warrant scheduling a class.
- 5. A distinct advantage of the AP program is flexibility. A student may enroll in one, some, or all AP courses at the grade 11 and 12 level though at the grade 10 level students are encouraged to register in the four core subjects as part of a cohort group.
- **6.** Students are not required to schedule additional time to complete AP courses which leaves room for complementary courses of their choice.
- 7. Additional courses will be offered at the grade 11 level in World History and in grade 12 in Math 31AP Calculus to prepare students for pertinent AP exams.
- 8. Students registering in AP courses may obtain credit and/or Advanced Placement in major Canadian and American universities. Recognition is given for marks of 3 or higher out of a possible 5 on AP exams. Students may use the higher grade of either their AP or 30 level class mark when applying to post-secondary institutions such as the University of Alberta.
- **9.** Full AP students have access to university scholarships unavailable to students in regular courses.

### Salt and Light - Lenten Reflection –

Here we are, nearly in the middle of Lent. We know that Lenten observance is about fasting, prayer, and almsgiving and that these things are good for us spiritually and often physically. However, it can be very easy to make your Lenten sacrifice something you "just do" rather than a spiritual practice that actually changes your heart and brings you closer to God. In one sense, Nike got it right with their "just do it" slogan. There is an element of our Lenten observance that just has to be done. Giving up (fasting from) something for Lent is not fun. We resist it. So we sometimes just have to bear down and do it. This often leads us into a place where we can be open to grow spiritually from doing a Lenten observance. The same goes with charity - sometimes it is difficult to give, as we can often be selfish people. Yet we know if we just give – even when it hurts – we receive and grow. Finally, it can often be difficult to pray in our busy and noisy world. It can be a challenge to find the time and space to pray – and then once we find it, our mind wants to race back to other things we have to do. Herein is the beauty of "just doing" prayer. Sometimes it might take a well-known prayer or something like the rosary that we can "do". This can get us in the habit of prayer – and give God "room to work", allowing our prayer time to blossom and become more a prayer of the heart than a task. What I love about Lent is that it gives us a target – something to do – that if we heed the call, we open ourselves up to the God who is always ready to pour out his love and grace on us. It isn't too late to heed the call of Lent. So, this Lent, use

### **Cooper Ray**



Cooper Ray is a dynamic and light-hearted speaker and musician who shares his faith with honesty and passion. Through story, humor, and audience participation, Cooper leads groups of all ages to a greater awareness of who they are as Catholic Christians and how to recognize God's presence in their lives.

He has entertained, motivated, and inspired youth and adults at Proud 2B Catholic Music Festivals, Catholic Heart Workcamps, Abbey Youth Festival as well as at numerous diocesan, parish, and school events across the country. Cooper has presented workshops at the National Conference for Catholic

Youth Ministry and led music and emceed at catechetical sites at World Youth Day. His relevant message and crowd interaction can reach a teen all the way in the back row.

Cooper received his call to ministry while serving as a camp counselor at a Catholic summer camp during his college years. It was at camp where God ignited Cooper's love for music and knowledge of ministry and started him on a journey of drawing youth and adults to know and live the Gospel.

After six summers, he transitioned into diocesan ministry in Baton Rouge where he spent 10 years, including seven as the director of youth ministry. Soon after arriving in Baton Rouge, Cooper's speaking ministry took off and schools, parishes, and other dioceses began to invite him to share his stories, music, and life experiences.

After 16 years in formal ministry, he started the next phase in his journey, answering the call to go on the road full-time. Cooper has been a contemporary music liturgy director at his parish for the past seven years and recently released his first solo album, *Wake the Dawn*. He was a contributing writer for Josh Blakesley's "Our God is Good" and was featured on Steve Angrisano's album *Live: Songs from the Road*. He holds a bachelor's degree in psychology and a master's in pastoral studies.

Cooper lives in Baton Rouge, Louisiana with his wife Laura.
