A Message from Mr. Hauptman, **Superintendent**

During 2012 the news headlines of security breaches and safety concerns brought to our attention the importance of reviewing our security and safety practices that protect not only those who work in our buildings but also our visitors. The first step we took was to ensure that all schools follow a strict sign in and out process for visitors (and employees who the school is not their regular work site) in addition to the locking of all doors except the main entrance. We are also establishing processes and solutions for schools that do not have the current ability to directly monitor their main entrance to the school.

The reasons for these changes are as follows:

- To make sure that all visitors report to the office to avoid the possible disruption of regular programming in our schools. For example, parents knocking on classroom doors to drop off forgotten lunches may not seem like a big problem but it is disruptive. The lunch can be simply left at the office for a student to pick up at break time.
- To ensure that individuals who have legitimate business in the schools are directed appropriately to places within our buildings.
- That an identifier badge or visitor badge is acquired so that students and staff know that an individual has the right to be in the building. If someone is seen without, the staff and students know that they need to report this individual's presence in the school to the office.
- In the case of a fire or other emergency procedures that we are aware of all individuals within our buildings so they are not missed if an evacuation is required.
- This process provides a sense of security to our parents and students and demonstrates that we do care

January 18, 2013 enough to take the time to make safety first and convenience second.

Starting today, January 7th, Central Learning Services (CLS) implemented a new sign-in process. EICS staff who do not work in the CLS building are now required to sign in at Reception & receive a numbered Visitor Pass. Each Visitor Pass is on a breakaway lanyard, and must be visibly worn while in the building. Upon leaving the building, visitors are required to sign out at Reception and return the Pass. The only entrance to CLS for employees and visitors will be the main front door at Reception.

Individuals such as EICS maintenance staff and EICS technical support staff will have name badges - but are still required to sign in and out of CLS and schools. As Superintendent, I too am required to sign in and out of schools. So, if you see me walking by past the office, you have every right to stop me and remind me that I have to sign in.

Supervisors are responsible to ensure that all staff are aware of these security measures.

We appreciate your efforts to make this system work and that we continue to make our schools safe and caring places for all.

Accountability Pillar Surveys (AP Surveys)

The 2012-13 School Accountability Pillar Surveys will be mail by Alberta Education at the end of January. All parents of grade 10 students are strongly encouraged to complete the survey. Your feedback is important to the school and assists us in determining our strengths as well as areas for growth. Similar surveys will also be completed by all grade 10 students and teaching staff.

All surveys are anonymous and ask questions about experiences with the school. Your participation in the survey helps provide important information on the quality of education your child is receiving, so we encourage you to return your survey promptly. The Accountability Pillar uses a set of 16 indicators consisting of survey of students, parents and teachers on various aspects of quality; student outcomes such as dropout and high school completion rate; and provincial assessments of student learning. Survey results will be available in May2013 and will be reported publicly as part of the school's three year education plan.



Measuring the quality of your child's education

We want to know that our children are receiving a quality education in a great school. Grades are important, but there's more to it.

A great school helps every child to make the most of their talents and abilities, is welcoming, caring, respectful, safe and allows parents to play a key role. It's all about each student's success.

While it's easy to agree on such goals, how do we measure our progress toward them?

The Accountability Pillar is an innovative and straightforward way to measure our learning goals as schools, school authorities and as a provincial government.

School authorities receive a results report that is colour-coded and easy to read. At a glance, it points out successes and areas of concern from both a local and provincial perspective.

The results report shows which measures have improved, remained consistent and which have declined. It allows everyone — parents, teachers, school authorities, students and the province — to celebrate successes and respond to challenges together.

The Accountability Pillar looks at:

- Survey results every year between January and March we survey students, their parents and teachers to see how they perceive the quality of education they receive and take part in
- Student learning indicators such as dropout rates, high school completion rates and the number of students eligible to receive Rutherford Scholarships
- Student results from Provincial Achievement Tests and Diploma Exams
